How to write a narrative

In a narrative we tell a story or recount an event.

The story can be true or imaginary.

We usually use past tenses.

Remember!

1 Structure

Give your story a clear beginning, middle and ending.

2 Content

- Make your story as interesting and exciting as possible.
- Talk about the atmosphere and your feelings.
- Use a variety of verbs, adjectives and adverbs to add interest.
- Use a range of past tenses.
- Use sequencing words and linkers to indicate the order of events.

Useful language

Starting: I had never been so excited / happy, etc. / It was the best / worst day of my life. / It was completely dark! / I will always remember . . . / One of my happiest / worst memories . . .

Time expressions: one day, / last week, / two days ago / since Monday / for a week/ at midnight,

Time linkers: When ... / As soon as ... / While ...

Sequencing words: Before ... / At first, ... / Later, ... / Then ... / After that, ... / Afterwards, ...

Manner adverbs: angrily / happily / quietly / suddenly

Degree adverbs: really / very / extremely

Comment adverbs: amazingly / luckily / (un)fortunately
Feelings: surprised / excited / scared / lonely / worried / happy

Ending: In the end, ... / Never again! / What a/an ...! / I hope something like that never happens again!

Model question

Write a story about something frightening that happened on a journey.

Model answer

It was the most frightening moment of my life! I was late because I had overslept. I missed my normal train, so I took the 10.00 train instead. When I got off at Wyford, I stepped into a real nightmare.
